## Vocabulary Development

Staff are continuing to implement different Talk for Learning strategies in lessons and I'm seeing the strategies used in all sorts of lessons when I pop into classrooms.



So far, staff have focused on using one main strategy a month, although they are allowed to use others, in order to fully embed strategies over the course of the year.

In November, children were introduced to Paired Echoing. In pairs, as Amazing A or Brilliant B, children sit knee to knee. Amazing A will talk about a certain topic (something they have learnt or read during the lesson) and Brilliant B will listen, using the signals for pause and rewind if needed. Brilliant B will then echo back what they have heard before swapping over roles.



December saw staff expand on this, with children listening to more than one person giving them some information as part of a carousel activity. Paired Echoing took place, before the children moved round in the carousel and repeated the activity. Sometimes, teachers chose for the children to hear the same information again, albeit from a different person, but children have also been challenged to listen to more than one piece of information each time the carousel moves!

In January, children have been having a go at 'Mum Went to Aldi', a task I'm sure many of you will recognise! The teacher will pose a topic, such as multiples of 8, French clothing words, acts of kindness, countries in Europe, 3D shapes, etc.




Child 1 will name a 3D shape, 'sphere'.

Child 2 will repeat Child 1's shape and add one of their own, 'sphere and cuboid'.

Child 3 will repeat the first two shapes and add one of their own, 'sphere, cuboid and triangular prism', and so on.

This is a great one for you to try at home with your children!

This month we are focusing on Triads. This involves paired talk again but this time with a third person who acts as an observer. Their role is to make notes, coach and praise good speaking and listening behaviours of the other two children.



#### <u>Spellings</u>



We've been asked by several parents in recent weeks about whether there are any good spelling apps on the market for children to use. Bloomsbury Education's 'Let's Do Spelling' apps are really good—they focus in on a specific age range so that the spellings are tailored towards the national curriculum learning objectives for your child's year group. The app is £3.99 in the Apple App Store and Bloomsbury also have Let's Do Times Tables apps if you fancy giving those a try too!

A similar app, available on Android too, is Squeebles Spelling Test. This also costs £3.99 and you will need to download spelling tests (for free). They have tests for specific spelling patterns and also National Curriculum words at Level 3 and Level 4.



# <u>Safeguarding</u>

The UK Safer Internet Centre has published guidance on using the social networking app Tik Tok. The app allows users to record, create and upload videos of themselves lip-syncing to songs and audio clips. Guidance includes: how to enable privacy settings; using parental controls in the app; age requirements for using Tik Tok; how to report inappropriate or offensive content and functionality to be aware of.
