SIPHONO-WHAT?

IF you think this is a bit of string <u>floating</u> in water, think again! It could actually be the longest animal ever recorded. This is a siphonophore ("sighfon-o-fore") — a long, stringy, stingy creature <u>related</u> to jellyfish. It was discovered by scientists exploring the deep sea off the coast of Australia. It's thought to be around 150 feet long (46 metres), which would make it three times as long as a humpback whale.






FLAMINGO FRIENDS

NEW research has shown that <u>flamingos</u> are friendly and loyal birds. Scientists from Exeter University studied four flamingo flocks for four years. They found that, even though they can live in a giant <u>flock</u> of up to two million, flamingos have <u>buddies!</u> They make small friendship groups and help each other with feeding and nesting.

THE SMELL OF LOVE

MALE ring-tailed lemurs like to smell nice for the girls! A new study has shown that when males want to impress the females, they release a fruity-smelling perfume from a patch on their wrists. They then rub their tails against the patch and wave their tails around so that females can get a good whiff of their "perfume"! The behaviour is known as "stink flirting". Yes, really.





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
