# Claim to the Throne



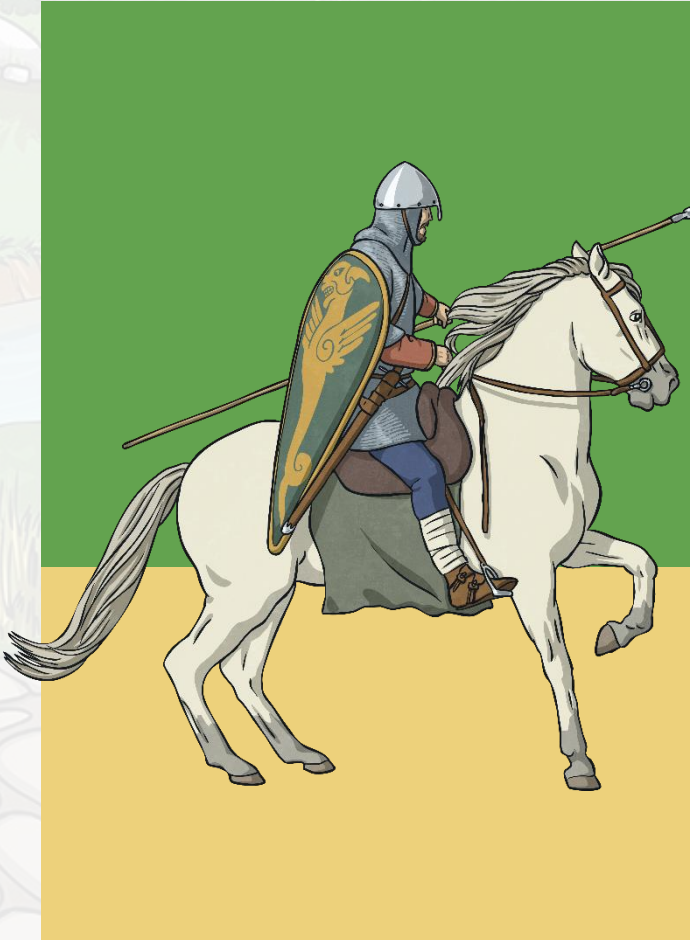
William's claim to the throne was through his cousin, Edward the Confessor, who was king before him.

# Interesting Facts



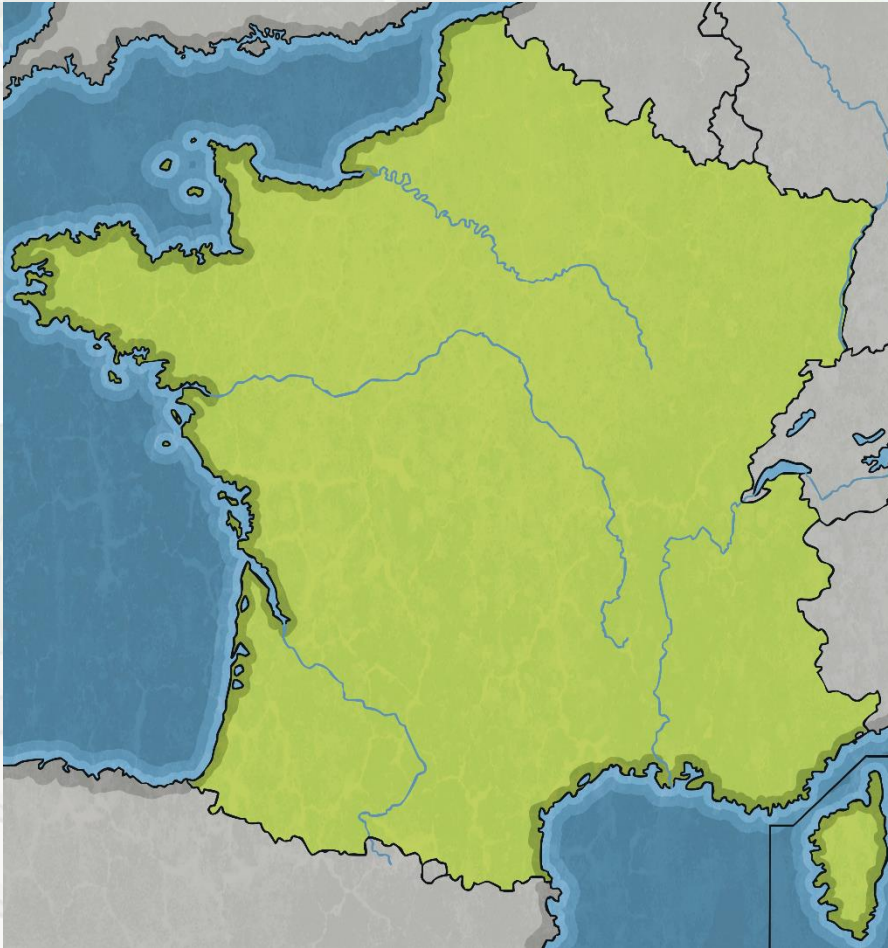
- William and his army defeated Harold Godwinson in the battle of Hastings.
