Book Bags

As the end of the year approaches, could we remind you to avoid buying expensive school bags for your children? We routinely get pulled up on Health and Safety audits and Fire audits that our cloakrooms in the corridors take up too much room and this is due to the size of the bags that children are bringing to school—these very often knock off coats hung on top onto the floor.



From September 2025, children will only be allowed to bring a book bag to school: there is no need for a larger bag than this—a book bag will fit a water bottle and reading books and this is all the children NEED to bring to school each day.

From 30th June, the school office will be selling book bags: you will be able to purchase these directly using your School Money account and they will be sent home with your child. Alternatively, book bags can be purchased directly from uniform suppliers Schoolwear Solutions, Chaddesden or Uniform Direct on Babington Lane. Plain navy book bags from other suppliers are also available (e.g. Amazon).

School Dinner Menu

The children have been feeding back to Mr O'Donnell via the School Council about our new school dinners. Whilst overall, they are fans of the new company, Mellors, they have also expressed their disappointment that weekly pizza has disappeared from the menu cycle and that the popular 'all day breakfast' from the opening menu did not appear on the main menus after the launch menu.

Last week, myself and Mrs Hardisty met with the rep from Mellors and fed this back and—great news—weekly pizza is back: this time on 'Meat-free Mondays' and the All Day Breakfast also makes a return to the new menu cycle—next week too! What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

... MSG ME...

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With more than two billion active users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls, WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service. Its end-to-end encryption only allows messages to be viewed by the sender and any recipients: not even WhatsApp itself can read them. This privacy issue has been in the spotlight recently, as the UK's Online Safey Bill proposes to end such encryption on private messaging; WhatsApp is unwilling to do so and has reportedly considered withdrawing its service in the UK should this legislation go ahead.



EVOLVING SCAMS

WhatsApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammers. Recent examples scammers. Recent examples include posing as the target's child, requesting a money transfer because of a spurious 'emergency'. Plus a scam where fraudsters trigger a verification message by attempting to log in to your account, then (posing as WhatsApp) call or text to ask you to repeat the code back to them, giving them access.

To start a chat, someone only needs the mobile number of the WhatsApp user that they want to message. If your child has ever given their number out to someone they don't know, that person could then contact them via WhatsApp. It's also possible that your child might be added to a group chat (by one of their friends, for example) containing other people that they don't know.

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows news to be shared rapidly – whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more than five times on the app now display a "Forwarded many times" label and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they've just that the message they've just received is far from an original ... and might not be entirely factual, either.

'VIEW ONCE' CONTENT

The facility to send images or messages that can only be viewed once has led to some WhatsApp users sharing inappropriate images or abusive texts, knowing that the recipient can't re-open them later to use as evidence of misconduct. People used to be able to screenshot this 'disappearing' content – but a recently added WhatsApp feature now blocks this, citing increased privacy.

CHAT LOCK

Another new option allows users to store certain messages or chats in a separate 'locked chats' folder, saved behind a passcode, fingerprint or face ID authentication. The risk here is that this function creates the potential for young people to hide conversions and content that they suspect their parents wouldn't approve of (such as age-inappropriate material).

VISIBLE LOCATION

WhatsApp's 'live location' feature lets users share their current whereabouts, which can be helpful for friends meeting up or parents checking that their child's safely on the way home, for example. However, anyone in your child's contacts list or in a mutual group chat can also track their group chat can also track their location – potentially letting strangers identify a child's home address or journeys that they make regularly.



..TYPING.. Advice for Parents & Carers

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage your child to treat unexpected messages with caution: get them to consider, for example, whether the message sounds like something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step verification adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account.

FAKE NEWS

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

It's wise to change your child's WhatsApp settings (go to 'Privacy', then 'Groups') to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chats without needing approval: you can give permission to 'My Contacts' or 'My Contacts Except ...'. Additionally, if your child needs to use 'live location', emphasise that they should enable this function for only as long as they need – and then turn it off.

THINKING BEFORE SHARING

Help your child to understand why it's important to stop and think before posting or forwarding something on WhatsApp. It's easy – and all too common – for content to then be shared more widely (even publicly on social media). Encourage your child to consider how an ill-judged message might damage their reputation or upset a friend who sent something to them in confidence.

CHAT ABOUT PRIVACY

Some parents like to check in with their child about how they're using WhatsApp, explaining that it will help to keep them safe. If you spot a 'Locked Chats' folder, you might want to talk about the sort of chats that are in there, who they're with and why your child wants to keep them hidden. Also, if your child has sent any 'view once' content, you could discuss their reasons for using this feature.
